Do Religions Feed Conflicts?

Summary

The activity aims to discover when and how religion is connected to wars and conflicts, throughout history and today, starting from some more known cases

Description of the activity

A path divided into some emblematic passages, which can then be further expanded:

- The crusades and the conflict between Christians and Muslims in the Middle Ages;
- The conflicts between Catholics and Protestants in Europe between the 16th and 17th centuries
- The conflicts between Shiites and Sunnis between the twentieth and twenty-first centuries
- It is advisable to link this activity to that presented in table 3

Activity structure:

The activity develops

- In the classroom, in the whole class (20-30 students), during the presentation phase by the teacher
- At home reading the historical documents assigned
- In class for the discussion of the texts, for groups (5-6 students per group)
- In the classroom, as a whole class, for the presentation of group work and the discussion on the acquired knowledge
- Concluding test, prepared by the teacher on the basis of the materials used and the conclusions drawn up
- Resources needed: history books, articles and videos selected by teachers, (use of internet or DVD movies), notebook / notebook, pc and necessary for video projection; analysis cards for audiovisual texts
- Previous knowledge of participants necessary: geo-historical knowledge of framing, ability to listen and analyze visual texts
- Use digital writing programs (Word, Excel, PowerPoint)
- Activity duration: for work in class 6-8 hours

Learning Objectives

- Development of knowledge in religious history
- Development of comparison skills and critical analysis
- Development of skills in the field of relationships (cooperation in group work, classroom dialogue)
- Development of skills in the operational field (comprehension and analysis of written and audiovisual texts)

Expected Outcomes

Identification and critical understanding of historical phenomena, of causality and connection. Ability to distinguish and connect theological-spiritual aspects to social, economic and psychological elements

Understanding the connection between past and present (around the emblematic use of some key terms "holy war", "crusade")



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Target group

The activity is aimed specifically at students aged 16-18 It can be simplified by adapting it to students aged 14-16
